APPENDIX D

COMPARISONS BETWEEN THE 1971 AND 1981 INDUSTRIAL CODING SYSTEMS

In preparing the Industrial Classification for use in the 1981 Census, certain changes were made to that used for the 1971 Census to bring it into closer conformity with the NACE classification recommended as a standard throughout member states of the EEC. These changes have the greatest impact on some detailed industry headings within the Manufacturing sector. The effects on the Industry Groups are small.

In addition, within the Distribution sectors a much broader grouping was used because of the difficulties of distinguishing with any precision the specific types of business involved in very many returns.

In all sectors, other than the Manufacturing sector and the Wholesale and Retail sectors, the categories of business or industry distinguished in this Volume correspond with those used in Volume III (Industries) of the 1971 Census of Population.

In Tables 7, 13A and 13B the discontinuities in the coding systems between 1971 and 1981, as described below, have been allowed for. Therefore the information in these tables provides a consistent basis for comparisons between the two years.

MANUFACTURING INDUSTRIES

Most of the categories distinguished here correspond to those used in 1971 but changes have been made to some categories and the relationship between the 1971 and 1981 coding systems in these cases is outlined below.
