



### Precentage of households that have experienced any crime, classified by region, a4 1998

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## Quarterly National Household Survey

Crime and Victimisation Quarter 4, 1998 and 2003

## Sharp rise in level of personal crime

In the fourth quarter of 2003, over one in twenty (5.2%) persons aged 18 or over indicated that they had been a victim in the previous year of at least one of the following personal crimes: theft with violence; theft without violence; or physical assault (excluding domestic violence or sexual assault). The comparable rate for the fourth quarter of 1998 was less than half the 2003 rate at a little over one in forty or 2.4%. See tables 1a & 1b.

These results are taken from the QNHS modules on Crime and Victimisation, which were undertaken in the fourth quarters of 1998 and 2003 and refer to crime experienced in the previous twelve months.

Almost 11% of young adults aged 18-24 reported that they had been victims of either a theft or an assault in the 12 months prior to the 2003 survey. Young males and females experienced the same levels of theft without violence (5.7%). However young males were the group most at risk of physical assault with 5.5% reporting that they had been assaulted, and were also the group most at risk (3.5%) of theft with violence. See table 1a.

The incidence of crimes against property remained relatively unchanged over the same five-year period. In the fourth quarter of 2003, 11.7% of all households indicated that they had been victims to varying degrees over the previous year of at least one of the following crimes: burglary; theft of or from motor vehicles; bicycle theft; or vandalism. The comparable figure five years previously was slightly higher at 12.1%. See tables 17a & 17b.

While exposure to crimes against property remained highest in the Dublin region, where 18.7% of households had been a victim of one of the types of crime surveyed, this represented a slight decrease on the figure recorded five years previously (20.1%). Outside the Dublin region exposure to household crime was highest in the Mid-East (12.4%) and Mid-West (11.1%) and lowest in the West (7.2%). See tables 17a, 17b and graphs opposite.

Just over 80% of those surveyed in 2003 considered that crime was either a "serious" or "very serious" problem – compared with almost 77% in 1998. However, the percentage that considered it to be a "very serious" problem increased more sharply from 38.4% in 1998 to 46.3% in 2003. There was, however, very little change in the sense of security amongst the public at large over the period, either alone in the home or walking alone after dark in their neighbourhood. See tables 12,13 & 14.

Despite some slippage since 1998, the public's rating of the work of the Gardaí at local level is still high with almost three out of every five who responded to this question indicating in 2003 that they considered it to be either "good" or "very good". See table 16.

### Incidence of personal crime doubles in five years

The proportion of persons who suffered theft with violence increased from 0.7% to 1.4% in the 5 years between the two modules while the proportion who had suffered theft without violence increased from 1.2% to 3.1% over the same five year period. In relation to physical assault there was an increase from 0.7% to 1.2%. Overall, the percentage of adults who experienced one or more of these crimes more than doubled between 1998 and 2003 from 2.4% to 5.2%. This increase in personal crime is evident to varying degrees across all age groups and regions. See tables 1a & 1b.

Young persons were more likely to have experienced personal crime than their older counterparts with 10.8% of the 18-24 age group reporting that they had been victims, compared to just 1.9% of those in the 65+ age group. In line with this, students were the most likely (13.0%) to experience personal crime while retired persons had the lowest exposure (1.9%).

Just over 6% of males had been victims of crime compared to 4.3% of females. Persons living in the capital (7.3%) were most likely to experience crime while those living in the Midlands (2.6%) were least likely. These patterns were also reflected in the 1998 figures, although the proportions are higher in the 2003 figures. See tables 1a & 1b.

## Non-nationals experience of crime

The crime and victimisation modules for both 1998 and 2003 suggest that non-nationals were more likely to experience crime than their Irish counterparts. In 2003 just over 5% of Irish persons indicated that they had experienced crime, compared to 5.4% of persons from the remaining EU-15 countries and 6.9% of persons from other countries. The comparable figures from the 1998 survey were 2.3%, 3.3% and 5.8% respectively. *See tables 1a, 1b and background notes*.

## **Burglary**

About one household in every thirty was burgled during the course of the 2003. The highest rates were reported in the Dublin (4.8%) and Midland (4.4%) regions while the lowest rates were in the West (1.8%), South-West (1.8%) and Border (1.9%) regions. *See table 17a*.

Over 15% of households that were burgled in 2003 suffered more than one such incident in the previous twelve months. Over a half (52.7%) occurred while someone was at home and 5.7% of these involved the use or threat of a weapon. The corresponding figures five years previously were 46.9% and 4.0% respectively. Just over 1% of cases where someone was at home resulted in an injury to a resident. *See tables 18 & 19a.* 

In over a third (37.5%) of burglaries there was no cost/losses to the household, and the damage was less than €635 (Ir£500) for more than half of the remaining burglaries. *See table 19c*.

### **Vandalism**

Vandalism was the most common form of crime experienced by households in the 12 months prior to the survey in the fourth quarter of 2003 with almost one in twenty (4.8%) reporting at least one incident. Households in Dublin (7.9%) were the most likely to experience vandalism while those in the Midlands (2.3%) were the least likely. There was very little change in the level of vandalism between 1998 and 2003. *See tables 17a & 17b*.

Vandalism tends to be a recurring problem for households affected, with one third (32.5%) of vandalised households reporting more than one episode in the previous year. Damage to vehicles accounted for about half (50.2%) the cases reported while damage to property was cited in 40% of cases. *See tables 20 & 21a*.

### **Motor Vehicle Theft**

Over 1% of households with vehicles indicated that a vehicle had been stolen in the 12 months preceding the survey. The Dublin vehicle theft rate at 2.2% was almost more than double that recorded in any other region. Over two thirds (67.5%) of the vehicles taken were recovered. *See tables 17a, 22 & 23.* 

Theft from motor vehicles was more prevalent with 3.5% of households with a vehicle reporting at least one such incident in the course of the previous year. The risk of such theft was again highest in the Dublin (6.0%) and Mid-West (4.6%) regions. See table 17a.

## Bicycle theft

Almost 4% of all households with a bicycle experienced bicycle theft in the 12 months prior to the 2003 survey. Households, where the reference person was a student, were the most at risk of having their bicycles stolen with almost 13% of all such households affected in 2003. *See tables 17a & 26*.

## **Household security**

Over one in ten households had a monitored alarm in 2003 while a little over one in five households had an unmonitored alarm. Over 50% of all households had special locks fitted. Over the 5 year period between the two surveys, the proportion of houses with monitored alarms, unmonitored alarms, special locks, high fences and sensor locks all increased. *See table 27*.

## Reporting of crimes to the Gardaí

The proportion of crime reported to the Gardaí in 2003 varied considerably from over 90% in the case of motor vehicle theft to just under 39% in the case of vandalism. In general the level of reporting depended mainly on the seriousness of the crime and on the victim's perception as to whether the Gardaí could not, or would not, do anything in relation to the crime committed. While there were some exceptions, the level of reporting to the Gardaí tended to be down in 2003 compared with the situation in 1998. See tables 18 to 25b.

Theft of vehicles was the crime most likely to be reported to the Gardaí, and in 2003 over nine out of every ten (90.5%) vehicle thefts were reported to the Gardaí. This represents a decrease on the 1998 figure when almost 95% of vehicle thefts were reported. Just under 60% of thefts from vehicles were reported, virtually unchanged from the percentage reported in 1998 (59.4%). *See tables 23 & 24*.

Almost 70% of burglaries were reported to the Gardaí, however this is again lower than 1998 when the reporting rate was 78.4%. In slightly under 50% of cases the main reason cited for not reporting the burglaries was that the incident was not serious enough or there was no financial loss. This was followed by the perception that the Gardaí would not (18.1%) or could not (17.4%) do anything in relation to the crime committed. *See tables 18 & 19b.* 

Vandalism had the lowest rates of reporting, with less than 40% of households vandalised indicating that they reported the crime to the Gardaí. The most common reason for not reporting vandalism was the belief that the damage was not serious enough or that there was no financial loss. *See tables 20 & 21b*.

Reporting rates for personal crimes also changed over the period between the two surveys. The reporting rate for incidences of theft with violence was 59.1% in the 2003 survey compared with 61.5% in 1998. For theft without violence, the rate increased from 47.0% in 1998 to 53.9% in 2003, however the reporting rate for physical assaults fell from 57.2% in 1998 to 51.3% in 2003. *See tables 2, 6 & 8*.

### Satisfaction with the Gardaí

Just over 56% of persons in 2003 rated the work of the local Gardaí as either good or very good. When account is taken of persons who did not respond to this question (almost 4% of all respondents in 2003), it may be concluded that almost three out of every five (60%) have a positive opinion of the work of the Gardaí at local level. The corresponding level of satisfaction in 1998 was just over 63%. *See table 16*.

In general, older people were more satisfied with the Gardaí with almost two thirds of persons aged 65 or over rating them either good or very good in 2003 compared with just 47% of those aged between 18 and 24. The level of satisfaction, however, declined for all age groups between 1998 and 2003. *See table 16*.

Dublin residents were the least satisfied with the work of the Gardaí with one in seven rating it as either poor or very poor. Persons who had been a victim of any crime were also less satisfied with around one in four rating the work as poor or very poor. *See table 16*.

### Perception of seriousness of crime

Over 46% of persons considered that crime was a very serious problem in 2003 compared with 38% in 1998. The perception of the seriousness of crime varied with age, where close to 60% of those aged 65 and over considered it to be a very serious problem compared with around a third of those aged between 18 and 24. *See table 14*.

Males were less concerned than females with 41.5% seeing it as very serious compared with 51.0% of females. Almost 49% of people who had been a victim of crime considered it a very serious problem compared to 46.0% of those who had not been a victim. *See table 14*.

## **Perceptions of safety**

Just under three quarters (74.8%) of persons felt either very safe or safe walking alone in their neighbourhood at night, virtually no change on the proportion five years previously (73.7%). This varied depending on personal characteristics, with males and younger persons in general feeling safer than their counterparts. Persons who had not been a victim of any crime were also more likely to feel safer walking alone in their neighbourhood at night. *See table 12*.

The vast majority (93.9%) of persons indicated that they felt safe alone in their homes after dark. There was some variation with age and gender, with older persons and females feeling less safe. *See table 13*.

## **Background Notes**

### Reference period

A module on Crime and Victimisation was included in the Quarterly National Household Survey (QNHS) in the three months from September to November 2003. This was a repeat of a module asked in the same period in 1998.

### **Purpose of survey**

While the primary purpose of the QNHS is to collect information on employment and unemployment and the production of quarterly labour force estimates, it also includes modules on social topics of interest. The survey meets the requirements of Council Regulation (EC) No. 577/98, adopted in March 1998, which requires the introduction of quarterly labour force surveys in EU Member States.

#### Questionnaire

The module contained over fifty questions on crime-related topics, divided into two main sections - household and individual questions:

### Household

- security of premises
- burglary
- theft of and from vehicles
- vandalism
- theft of bicycles

### Individual

- theft with violence
- theft without violence
- physical assault
- perceptions and opinions in relation to crime, safety and the Gardaí

The module also included questions on the seriousness of crimes (such as cost and injuries) and on whether crimes were reported to the Gardaí. These questions related to the last incident, in cases where the household or person had been a victim of a particular kind of crime more than once in the past year. The survey did not ask about sexual assaults or domestic violence, as these questions are too sensitive and personal for inclusion in a general household survey such as the QNHS. The questions about crimes against individuals and about perceptions and opinions were confined to persons aged 18 or over participating directly in the survey.

### **Definitions of crimes**

**Burglary** Breaking and entering by a person into a premises (either a house/flat or an outbuilding). Thefts from gardens are not included nor thefts by a person who has the permission/right to be in the premises (as this would be classified as larceny or theft without violence).

**Vandalism** Damage done to any type of property or vehicle belonging to any member of the household, for example graffiti on house, shed or garden walls, damage to vehicles.

**Theft with violence** Stealing or attempting to steal something from a person by using force or threatening to use violence. This includes incidents such as mugging or attempted mugging.

**Theft without violence** Stealing or attempting to steal something from a person without involving force. Examples of this type of incident are pick pocketing or a jacket being stolen.

**Physical assault** Physical assault of a person, excluding attacks of a sexual nature and domestic violence.

Double-counting of incidents was avoided as much as possible. For example, if a person was attacked during a burglary then this incident would have been only recorded as burglary and not also as an assault.

### **Grossing factors**

The QNHS grossing procedure aligns the distribution of persons covered in the sample with independently determined population estimates at the level of sex, five-year age group and region. Given the Crime and Victimisation individual questions were asked to a sub-sample of the overall QNHS sample, the grossing factors applied in the derivation of the Crime and Victimisation results differ from those that were used in the preparation of the main QNHS estimates, and hence the overall populations do not necessarily match those presented in the main QNHS release.

### **Nationality**

The figures presented on nationality are based on a self perception question, in which the respondent could choose from a list of seventeen nationalities. It should be noted that as the QNHS is a household survey some nationalities may be under-represented in the figures.

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#### Presentation of results

The results of this module are being presented, in general, in the form of percentages. Some of the survey results should be interpreted with extreme caution as the number of respondents in certain detailed categories is too few to allow valid conclusions to be drawn. It should be noted that the 1998 figures have been revised from those previously published following revisions to the core QNHS data based on the results of the 2002 Census of Population. The 1998 data on individuals has also been recalculated to exclude data gathered in non-direct interviews.

# Household reference person

The household tables include classifications by the sex, broad age group and principal economic status of the household reference person, i.e. the first person recorded in the household by the ONHS Interviewer.

# Comparison with Garda statistics

The survey results are not directly comparable with the crime statistics published by the Garda Siochána, as there are fundamental differences in sources, definitions and classification methodology. The latter provides a much more detailed breakdown of indictable offences reported or known to the Gardaí, non-indictable offences prosecuted and offences committed by juvenile offenders. The CSO survey results provide a more aggregated view of the level of crime, including unreported incidents, together with details of the demographic characteristics of victims.

**Acknowledgements** The original questions asked in the 1998 module on crime and victimisation were designed with the assistance of an advisory committee comprising representatives of the following organisations: An Garda Síochána, Department of Justice, Equality and Law Reform, Department of an Taoiseach, Economic and Social Research Institute, National Council on Ageing and Older People, National Womens Council, the Health Boards and other researchers. To allow comparison over time the questions were for the most part not changed in the 2003 module.

### Regions

The regional classifications in this release are based on the NUTS (Nomenclature of Territorial Units) classification used by Eurostat. The NUTS3 regions correspond to the eight Regional Authorities established under the Local Government Act, 1991 (Regional Authorities) (Establishment) Order, 1993, which came into operation on 1 January 1994. The NUTS2 regions, which were proposed by Government and agreed by Eurostat in 1999, are groupings of the NUTS3 regions. The composition of the regions is set out below.
